Sharky's Diary – Chapter Fourteen

Well here it is, the final Sharky's diary. I would like to thank all the people who have taken the time to talk to me about their appreciation for this diary. I am very pleased to hear that it has been useful for so many, and hopefully it will continue to be. Sharky has now competed in 3 shows. I must admit I was feeling a bit nervous before the first run, and was very pleased when it was finished. Fortunately Sharky was about the 6th dog on in the first class at Central Hawkes Bay, so I didn't have long to wait. I did a slightly lateral 3 jump leadout and he waited perfectly ending up with a clear round and 2nd place! I was absolutely thrilled with that result (and because I got a ribbon, thought I could make this the final diary!). Sharky also went clear in starters 3 and was 3rd place in that. In the novice classes I was pleased with him, but very surprised in Novice 2 when he self-released off the cross-over contact. It was good that he did this so early in his agility career because it made me aware that I could not take things for granted. He had knocked the long jump shortly before the cross over so might have been a bit off balance. This was not the only long jump that he knocked, which reminded me that he hadn't really done many at full length. I did a few of these before the next show, and he hasn't knocked one since which is good.

Sharky really suffered from bad handling at NDTA. I said I was going to remember that he was a baby dog, but that went all out the window when I was in the ring. In one starters I imagined he was Cannon and ran ahead at the weaves saying "go go go". Now with all the training that I have done, I would have expected him to still weave, but with the excitement of being inside, and near the end of the course it was a bit much for him so he popped the last weave. He did some lovely work, was not worried about the mud or the indoors show which could have been quite unsettling for a young dog. I think it is all the work that I have done in different environments which has made him comfortable in

most surroundings. He did go clear in the jumpers pairs for 6th place, and also had a clear round in AD. Funny that he could manage clear in the AD, but that is the only clear he has managed with contact equipment!

At his 3rd show he seemed to suddenly find another gear and was absolutely hooning around the courses. He possibly hasn't ever trained while moving this fast either, and consequently had a few jumps down, and also was having trouble finding the 2nd weave pole at speed. He would get the entry nicely, but then come back through the 3rd pole. I did some training at home with him trying to train for maximum speed through 3 poles, and then 6. I could not get him to make a mistake no matter how many obstacles I did before the weaves to get him hooning. I will just have to see how things go – he does know how to weave, but needs to develop a bit of control while entering so he can make the turn. I am sure this will come right in time. I have watched video of his runs frame by frame and am very happy with his jumping action. He has knocked rails because he is going faster than expected, and needs to develop more control. As he is jumping well, again I will just see what happens as I think he will sort this out over time. His contacts have continued to be good, and in one class he did an awesome A-frame, leaping over the apex but still controlling himself for his nose-touch. I have been slack in the ring and often have forgotten to give a verbal marker for the good nose-touch. I need to say "yes" or "good" so he knows when he has achieved the desired behaviour, and therefore will repeat it.

My training objectives over the next few weeks will consist of training weave entries at speed, and possibly doing some more cavaletti work to encourage rear-end control.

And I must include congratulations to Susan MacKay and Rainstar Phantom of the Opera – Sharky's brother. Susan has done great training with Phantom, but obviously handled him much better than I did with Sharky at the NDTA because they ended up with the Top Dog Trophy. Awesome work Susan!

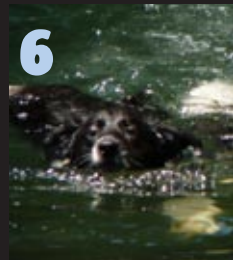
I live in Christchurch and immigrated to NZ from South Africa in 2000. My wife Jackie and I have three lovely daughters and two dogs.
